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## **Trustees' Report**

The trustees, who are the directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of Doncaster Rape and Sexual Abuse Counselling Service (DRASACS) for the year ended 31 March 2024.

#### Objectives and activities

## Objects and aims

What do we do?

The aims of DRASACS are:

- 1. To relieve the mental and physical distress of people who have suffered sexual assault, in particular by providing a counselling service and advocacy service.
- 2. To relieve the mental distress of people supporting and/or caring for adults or children who have been sexually assaulted, in particular by providing counselling, group work and information.
- 3. To advance the education of the public, by raising awareness, and promoting and/or conducting education and research around the issues of sexual assault.

## **Trustees' Report**

#### Objectives, strategies and activities

DRASACS services are free to all in and around Doncaster and include:-

#### Specialist Counselling Services

- Available to all genders aged 18 and over
- Free face to face, telephone and webcam / online sessions
- EMDR, CBT, psychodynamic, person-centred therapy, integrative therapy, art therapy

#### Independent Sexual Violence Advocates (ISVA's)

- Our ISVA (Independent Sexual Violence Advocate) service offers practical help, advice and information for victims of rape and sexual abuse and their families
- Practical support for adults through the judicial process and beyond

#### Children and Young Persons Counselling

- Available to all genders aged 5-18 years, parent support and sibling support is available
- Face to face appointments
- Online service available for teenagers
- Variety of therapy used to reinforce healthy adult / child relationships

#### Children and Young Persons Advocacy

- Our CHISVA (Children and young peoples Independent Sexual Violence Advocate) service provides practical and emotional support to children and young people aged 5 to 18 years, who have experienced rape, sexual abuse or sexual exploitation
- CHISVA's provide independent practical and emotional support, through all police investigation and any court processes

#### Group therapy

- Available for all genders 18 years+
- Face to face post therapy support group
- Providing the opportunity for those who have completed one to one counselling, to meet others with experience of rape and sexual abuse

#### Training and awareness sessions

- Training available for professionals, schools and any settings providing support for adults and CYP
- Awareness sessions and meetings available to education settings, parents / carers and professionals

#### Public benefit

When planning the activities for the year the trustees have considered the Charity Commissions guidance on public benefit. The activities described above, and achievements and future plans outlined elsewhere in this report have a positive direct impact on many people in Doncaster and an indirect impact on the community in general, and thus deliver public benefit.

As noted above DRASACS services are free to all in and around Doncaster and include:-

- Specialist Counselling Services
- Independent Sexual Violence Advocates (ISVA's)
- Children and Young Persons Counselling and Advocacy
- Training and awareness raising

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

#### **Trustees' Report**

#### Use of volunteers

The charity is grateful to all its volunteers and in particular its trustees for their time commitment and expertise in supporting DRASACS.

#### Achievements and performance

Our staff are trained specialists and professional. DRASACS invests in staff development with training undertaken in safeguarding, pre-trial therapy, group therapy, supervision and ISVA and CHISVA. Alongside this, all staff access regular clinical supervision and the employee assistance programme. Our staff are a highly valued asset and have been instrumental in deciding the priorities for DRASACS. All staff are DBS checked and where required staff are also vetted by South Yorkshire Police.

In the 12-month period between 1 April 2023 and 31 March 2024 we achieved the following:

#### Adult Counselling Service

- 419 adults attended an "in depth referral" (was 424 in 22/23 and 323 in 21/22). This is a preliminary appointment offered when a client is first referred. They meet with a counsellor, either on phone or in person to discuss their needs and whether our service is appropriate for them.
- 287 adult clients went on to attend at least one therapy session, with 2141 regular sessions attended an average of 7.5 per client. (2022/23 figures were 282 adult clients and 2443 regular sessions.)
- 3466 appointments in total were offered throughout the year to over 18s (3677 in 22/23)
- Waiting times increased from 158 days at the start of the 22/23 financial year to 292 days in Quarter 4 of 23/24
- The DNA rate (percentage of appointments lost to non-attendance without any notification) during 23/24 has been 7.2% (2021/22 8%, 2022/23 6.9%)
- 79.7% of clients reported improvements in their mental health
- 72.9% of clients reported an increase in positive features in their life
- 100% of all respondents to our end baselines stated they felt their counselling was helpful.

#### Children and Young People Counselling Service

- 153 children and young accessed our counselling throughout the year (2022/23 174)
- In terms of mental wellbeing of these children and young people:
- o 38 had experience significant progress
- o 26 had started to experience progress
- o 44 were yet to experience progress
- o The remainder either did not attend or are awaiting their first appointment

#### ISVA service

Our aim is to help to give anyone the confidence, support and information needed to take control of their situation and move forward. ISVAs receive specialist training to support people who have disclosed sexual violence in order to provide a tailored support package. They have police vetting clearance and have enhanced DBS checks.

Our ISVA service is available to men, women, children and families, regardless of whether they have told the police or anyone else about the attack. Our ISVAs are fully trained by Lime Culture, and our ISVA service is accredited.

#### Client Feedback

Our clients are ultimately the reason why DRASACS exists and we strive for excellent to help all clients have the best quality of life they wish to achieve. The free, confidential, person-centred services that DRASACS offers are based on the needs of the client.

The counselling and ISVA service has continued to offer multiple modalities for support, including face to face therapy, webcam counselling, art and play therapy, telephone counselling, and practical support. Some feedback form the 2023/24 year is listed below:

"I definitely feel so much better about my life and understand myself, my councillor listened to me and was so caring that's why I was able to talk about my younger life even thought was hard, I'm so happy I plucked up the courage to get help, thank you so much for what you do"

"My counsellor was a massive support. I needed DRASAC. This service must stay. It's a life saver"

"It's changed my whole outlook on my life now and my future. I'm more emotionally stable and mature and feel a lot calmer now. I feel a sense of calm and peace. It's been life-changing for me and I'm now seeking a career with the counselling profession."

#### Financial review

The income for the year was £774,163 (2023: £885,380), and expenditure was £810,123 (2023: £869,960).

The decrease in income was as a result of a decrease in grant funding, with 2023 including £65,000 towards leasehold improvements, a £25,000 one year grant, and the final year's income of a multi-year grant which wasn't renewed for 2024.

Although some variable expenditure reduced in line with reduced income, the charity has a base level of fixed costs, so the reduction in expenditure was not as great as that in income. This resulted in a deficit of £35,960 compared to a surplus of £15,420 in 2023.

#### Policy on reserves

At the year end total reserves carried forward were £408,654 made up of £11,010 restricted funds and £397,644 unrestricted funds. (2023: Total funds of £444,612 including £49,792 restricted and £394,820 unrestricted general funds).

Total funds include £81,211 which could only be realised by disposing of fixed assets. The charity's unrestricted free reserves at 31 March 2024 were £316,433 (2023: £288,519).

The reserves policy commits the charity to assigning any unallocated funds to the reserves on a year on year basis until the reserves represent six month's expenditure of the Charity, which is estimated to be approximately £400,000. Following significant expenditure on leasehold improvements in 2023, unrestricted free reserves which were £401,240 at 31 March 2022 fell to £288,519 at 31 March 2023, but increased to £316,433 in 2024. The charity aims to gradually increase reserves to the target level.

#### Plans for future periods

#### Aims and key objectives for future periods

There has been a significant increase in the demand for our service, and increased waiting times, DRASACS will be focusing its efforts on how we can continue to respond to the demands for our services and maintain our resilience in a competitive funding market.

Organisational development so our people, processes and systems are working effectively and efficiently for the benefit of the clients we serve. This organisational development will particularly focus on:

- The development of staff capacity, so we can function well organisationally
- Better utilisation of data to inform strategic planning, service development, performance, and continuous improvement.
- · Researching and developing with new means of self-generating income

Improving financial resilience so our financial model, income generation strategies and resource development enable us to exist into the future.

To continue to deliver quality services for our clients, and assure service quality.

To adapt and introduce services that meet the changing needs of clients.

To continue our approach of being a more visible presence in the public sphere, attending gala and events, and pursuing public fundraising efforts

To seek out alternative grant funding, given the difficulty in securing funding from those who have historically funded us.

Continue to play a key role within the South Yorkshire Sexual Violence Partnership and also as part of the Crisis Alliance with partner agencies.

#### Structure, governance and management

#### Nature of governing document

Doncaster Rape and Sexual Abuse Counselling Service became a company limited by guarantee (company registration number 06920524) and a registered charity (registration number 1130947) on 1 June 2009.

The assets of Doncaster Rape and Sexual Abuse Counselling Service, an unincorporated charity, were donated to the charity on 1 April 2010.

#### Recruitment and appointment of trustees

In accordance with the charity's constitution new trustees are appointed by the existing board of trustees.

The trustees regularly review the composition of the board and recruit new trustees in the light of skills and experience required and available.

#### Induction and training of trustees

New trustees receive an induction from the CEO and support from the existing board of trustees. Trustee training is provided where necessary.

## Arrangements for setting key management personnel remuneration

Details of the key management personnel are included in the Reference and Administrative Details section of this report. Remuneration for key management personnel is set by the trustees and is based on the seniority of roles, market rates and individual performance.

#### Organisational structure

The Charity is governed by the Board of Trustees (who are also Directors for the purposes of the Companies Act). The Board of Trustees have appointed a CEO, Counselling Manager and ISVA Manager who manage DRASACS operationally on a day to day basis. The Board meets bi-monthly and monitors performance, developments and finance.

Our Trustees are all volunteers and use their skills to support DRASACS.

The board has approved policies for staffing, governance, finance and reserves, copies of which are available.

#### Relationships with related parties

#### Links with other organisations

DRASACS continues to deliver ISVA services in collaboration with Barnsley (BSARCS), Rotherham (RothACS) and Sheffield (SRASAC), under the umbrella of the South Yorkshire Sexual Violence Partnership (CIO) supporting people who have reported sexual offences to the Police on their journey through the criminal justice process.

DRASACS is also part of the Doncaster Crisis Alternative Alliance, a contract commissioned by South Yorkshire ICB, partnering with Doncaster Mind, People Focussed Group, and Open Minds to deliver mental health support.

#### Major risks and management of those risks

The charity's management and trustees regularly consider the major risks affecting the charity including those relating to strategic and reputational risk, operational risk, compliance risk and financial risk.

Significant risks such as those related to health and safety, and safeguarding are managed on a day to day basis by the senior management team, and are discussed at trustee meetings.

The significant risks currently affecting the charity are the current funding climate and scarcity of future funding in the charity sector, along with the impact of the last few years of inflation and cost of living increases. The charity has submitted many funding bids without success in the first half of 2024 but continues to attempt to seek out further diverse sources of funding. The organisation carefully monitors cashflow and finances, including matching forecast expenditure with income and continuing to seek out multiple year sources of funding to allow more certainty in the short to medium term.

The charity's general insurance policy includes trustee indemnity insurance to protect the trustees from claims arising from negligent acts, errors or ommisions occurring whilst on charity business. The premium in respect of this cover is not separately identifiable.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

#### 1 Charity status

The charity is limited by guarantee, incorporated in England and Wales, and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

#### 2 Accounting policies

#### Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

#### Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019 - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102). They also comply with the Companies Act 2006 and Charities Act 2011.

#### Basis of preparation

Doncaster Rape & Sexual Abuse Counselling Service meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

#### Going concern

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern nor any significant areas of uncertainty that affect the carrying value of assets held by the charity.

#### Income and endowments

All income is recognised once the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

#### Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies are recognised on a receivable basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the Charity before the Charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the Charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

#### Grants receivable

Grants are recognised when the charity has an entitlement to the funds and any conditions linked to the grants have been met. Where performance conditions are attached to the grant and are yet to be met, the income is recognised as a liability and included on the balance sheet as deferred income to be released.

#### Investment income

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank. Dividends are recognised once the dividend has been declared and notification has been received of the dividend due.

#### Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on estimated usage.

#### Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

#### Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### **Support costs**

Support costs include those functions which assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities, including admin costs, finance, IT, governance costs and other central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### **Governance costs**

These include the costs attributable to the Charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including preparation of statutory accounts and independent examination.

### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

#### Government grants

Government grants are recognised based on the performance model and are measured at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are classified as relating either to revenue or to assets. Grants relating to revenue are recognised in income in the period in which the charity has entitlement to the income and any performance conditions have been met. Grants relating to assets are recognised in full when there is unconditional entitlement to the grant.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes

#### Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000.00 or more are initially recorded at cost, and then carried at cost less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

#### Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

#### Depreciation method and rate

#### Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers or grant funders for services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised at the settlement amount less any provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the Charity will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of the receivables.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2024

#### Trade creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a resullt of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the Charity does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

#### Borrowings

Interest-bearing borrowings are initially recorded at fair value, net of transaction costs. Interest-bearing borrowings are subsequently carried at amortised cost, with the difference between the proceeds, net of transaction costs, and the amount due on redemption being recognised as a charge to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period of the relevant borrowing.

Interest expense is recognised on the basis of the effective interest method and is included in interest payable and similar charges.

Borrowings are classified as current liabilities unless the charity has an unconditional right to defer settlement of the liability for at least twelve months after the reporting date. The charity currently has no borrowings.

#### **Fund structure**

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustee's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the Charity.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

#### Pensions and other post retirement obligations

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme which is a pension plan under which fixed contributions are paid into a pension fund and the charity has no legal or constructive obligation to pay further contributions even if the fund does not hold sufficient assets to pay all employees the benefits relating to employee service in the current and prior periods.

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities when they are due. If contribution payments exceed the contribution due for service, the excess is recognised as a prepayment.
